## Thai families be evacuated

TWENTY-EIGHT family members of Thai Embassy staff and Thais work-ing with international agencies in Rangoon will be evacuated within the next couple of days as a result of the situation in Burma, Foreign Ministry spokesman Saroj Chavanaviraj said yesterday.

Mr Saroj said that the 28 had planned to leave for Bangkok today but their departure was postponed because of trouble expected in the Burmese capital. The spokesman could not say when they can leave Rangoon.

The ministry spokes-man said there are 45 staff members at the Thai Embassy.

Meanwhile, US Embassy spokesman Ross Petzing said yesterday that a "partial evacuation" of personnel at the US Embassy in Rangoon has also been ordered.

"There could be as many as 90 to 95 dependants. This is a precautionary measure," Mr Petzing said. Petzing said.
