

# Bombing threats cause panic among Burmese

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**Rangoon (AP)** — An unsigned and possibly bogus pamphlet threatening military bombings of government buildings caused panic yesterday among people living in the area.

The mimeographed pamphlet threatened shelling and aerial raids if authorities did not agree by 1.30 p.m. today to form an interim government to oversee general elections.

It was purportedly issued by the vice-chief of the navy, Rear-Adm Maung Maung Khin, and the vice chief of the air force, Maj-Gen Tin Tun.

It warned citizens to vacate areas around the headquarters of the ruling

Burma Socialist Programme Party: Ady Road, where former strongman Ne Win's house is situated; the offices of the Council of State; Tsing Tsong Palace, where military officers live; and the Inya Lake Hotel, where many top officials have taken refuge during the recent street demonstrations.

Demonstrators went around town announcing the ultimatum, causing panic among residents.

Many bogus publications have circulated during the current political confusion and it was not possible to determine the authenticity of the supposed military threat.

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
