Over 100 Burmese protest at embassy

"NE Win, Ne Win," shouted one demonstrator. "Get Out, Get Out," responded the others.

The echoes of slogans demanding the removal of Gen Ne Win's government reverberated all along Sathorn Road in Bangkok yesterday afternoon as a group of over 100 Burmese demonstrated in support of their countrymen who are determined to end one-party rule in Burma.

The demonstration was led by Tin Maung Win, chairman of the Committee for the Restoration of Democracy in Burma. Accompanying him during the hour-long demonstration, in front of the Burmese Embassy and the military attaché's office, were Ye Kyaw Thu, general secretary of the committee, and Henry Soe Win, who led the 1974 student uprising in Burma.

Banners, in Thai, English and Burmese, condemning the dictato-

rial rule of the Burmese government and the savage attacks on the people, were carried by the demonstrators, many of whom now reside in Thailand. They were joined by other Burmese from the US, Australia, Singapore and Malaysia.

A wreath was laid in the front of the embassy after the demonstration.

Tin Maung Win said that some of the members of the committee will return to Burma soon to join the demonstrators there. "Today, it was quite a successful demonstration," he said. "We have shown that we support the people in Burma."

He said that all Burmese living abroad are concerned about the present situation. Ne Win and his soldiers have killed over 3,000 people in Rangoon alone. And
